Extended learning and reading around the subject fires students' enthusiasm, improves their achievement, helps them take control of their own education and develops the independence that is the foundation for lifelong learning.

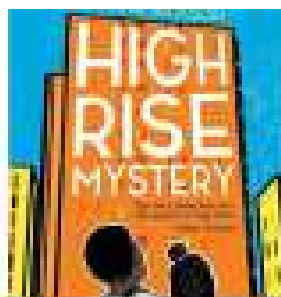

Read the *Bereshit* newspaper (on SharePoint – Language Department- Ivrit- Bereshit) – an introductory Hebrew newspaper for beginners.

You will be reading about the most contemporary and widely-used Hebrew. The articles focus on Israeli and international current events, as well as holidays and Jewish values. You will read proper Hebrew as well as Hebrew slang words, commonly used phrases and even words that have been adopted from other languages. The newspaper includes Hebrew-English dictionary of the new words which- (The dictionaries also include transliteration which helps to know how to read the words properly).
