LOU'S VIEWS – JOE BIDEN

After months of campaigning and debating, former Vice President Joe Biden has won the nomination. Despite a variety of candidates of different races, sexes and ages, the Democrats have narrowed the choice down to an old white man. How unique! This is not to mention Biden's vocal defence of segregation, bans on same-sex marriage, medical malpractice, and plagiarism. Yet even with his old age and controversy, Creepy Joe is persevering and is on the road to challenge the Orange War Criminal. A choice between an old white man steeped in corruption vs an old white man steeped in corruption is not what America deserves. It is time America elect a candidate who will end the charade of corruption and deception and restore accountability to the government.

HOW CLOSE ARE WE TO THE END OF LOCKDOWN?

Will lockdown end when we find a vaccine? Have any countries returned back to normal? Will we ever go back to normal again? These are all questions being asked by everyone across the UK and the world, but does anyone have any answers? This is what I intend to find out and discuss...

It was recently announced that the original 3-week lockdown would be extended another 3 weeks, making the light at the end of the tunnel even more difficult to see for households and businesses across the UK but will lockdown end after these 3 weeks? or is this the same context as hitting the snooze button on your morning alarm every 10 minutes? The answer is most probably the latter, as the Government have declared that lockdown rules will be reviewed every 3 weeks.

Dominic Raab, the Foreign Secretary who (at the time of writing) is standing in for the Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, as he recovers from suffering

with COVID-19 himself, has declared that the UK are in a “delicate and dangerous state” and it would be “irresponsible” to set a date on the end of lockdown and to even end lockdown prematurely as it would be “damaging” for both public health and the economy.

Many have speculated that lockdown will not be a certain time or date but rather a gradual process that could see different groups of people returning to work/school at different times, possibly as early as May or June. However, social distancing measures are still likely to be kept in place. Raab has set 5 criteria that need to be met before lifting the lockdown can even be considered and they are the following:

1. Ensuring that the NHS can cope with the demand for critical care.
2. There is a sustained and consistent fall in the death rates across the UK.
3. A decrease in the rate of infections across the UK.

4. There is an increase in testing and ensuring that there is enough PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) that can meet future demand.

5. There is confidence that a second peak cannot occur across the UK.

Other countries are beginning to reopen however, including Germany, who claim that the *Bundesliga*, Germany’s most elite football league can resume as early as 9th May. This transition back to normality which is already taking place across other European countries acts as a beacon of hope for us here in the UK, as it is also believed that we have already reached the peak of the coronavirus pandemic.

However, until all 5 of Raab’s criteria are met and health officials in the UK declare it safe to lift current restrictions, the UK remains in lockdown.

TOP 5 THINGS TO WATCH IN LOCKDOWN

1. *When They See Us* – this is an amazing limited series on Netflix re-enacting an infamous American court case from the late 80s. The show is set in New York (which at the time was plagued by racism and gang violence) and follows the story of five teenagers who were falsely accused, imprisoned, and 13 years later acquitted for the crimes which they were charged with. AGE RATING 15
2. *Friday Night Dinner* – if you're Jewish and haven't at least heard of this show I don't know where you have been for the last 3 years. This series of comical gold follows the Goodman family in their weekly Friday night dinners, often interrupted by their neighbour Jim. If you enjoy sitcoms, then this is a must watch. AGE RATING 15
3. *Tiger King* – This tracks a five-year story of the infamous and recently imprisoned "tiger king" Joe Exotic whose glamorous life as a tiger keeper is complicated by a television deal, animal rights associations, spontaneous fires, financial instability and of course Carol Baskin. Throughout this documentary, a man who once adored his tigers becomes blinded by a never-ending desperation for fame. AGE RATING 15
4. *Unorthodox* – based loosely on the memoirs of Deborah Feldman, *Unorthodox* narrates the story of Esty, a young Jewish girl living in a strict Hasidic community in New York who with the help of her non-Jewish piano teacher is able to escape to Berlin, finding a whole new strain of life. This story should especially resonate with us as it opened my eyes to the cultures within our own religion. AGE RATING 12
5. *12 Years A Slave* – this film adaptation of the 1853 memoirs of Solomon Northup is the truly harrowing tale of the injustices of slave culture. A freeborn black man is abducted and sold into slavery in a plantation for twelve years before finally being released and whilst there he sees the atrocities committed to slaves by plantation owners. 6 EASY RECIPES TO GET YOU THROUGH QUARANTINE

Delicious Mug Brownie

All you need is:

4.5 Tbsp flour, 3 Tbsp sugar, 2.5 Tbsp cocoa powder, 2 Tbsp melted butter, 2 Tbsp milk, Ice cream (optional) and chocolate chips (optional)

Method:

1. Mix all the ingredients, and add chocolate chips (optional), with a fork until thoroughly mixed. Make sure to scrape all ingredients that are stuck on the bottom and the sides of the cup.
2. Place in the microwave and heat for approximately 1 minute and 30 seconds making sure the brownie is still moist in the middle.
3. Leave for 2 minutes to continue to cook and cool down a little.
4. Add ice cream to the top and serve!

Chocolate cookies

All you need is:

1 cup of sugar, ½ cup of oil or melted margarine, ¼ cup of maple syrup (not essential but makes for a better texture), 3-4 Tbsp of preferred milk, 2 Tsp of vanilla extract, 1 2/3 cups of flour, ½ cup of cocoa powder, 1 Tsp baking powder and a pinch of salt

Method:

1. Mix together the oil, sugar, syrup, vanilla extract, and milk.
2. Add the remaining ingredients and mix together until you have a pliable dough
3. Scoop the dough into balls and put it onto a baking tray. Make sure to leave enough room as they spread a lot.
4. Bake for 10-12 minutes at 176°C

Take out and let cool for 10 minutes they its ready to eat!

Easy Banana Bread

All you need is:

1 ¾ cups of plain flour, 1 ¾ cups of sugar or dates, 2 Tsp of baking powder, ½ Tsp bicarbonate of soda, a pinch of salt, 1/3 cup of oil, 1 Tsp of vanilla extract, 3 large overripe bananas and ¼ cup of milk (only if the mixture is too thick after blending)

Method:

1. Mash bananas together in a bowl until smooth, add the oil and the vanilla and mix.
2. Add the flour, sugar, bicarbonate soda, baking powder, salt and mix together.
3. The batter should be slightly thick and a bit lumpy but if the mixture seems too thick add the milk.
4. Pour the batter into a greased baking tin and bake for around 45 minutes to an hour (keep on checking it) at 175°C.
5. Take out the oven and let cool for 10 minutes then its ready to eat!

Original Cheesecake

All you need is:

250g digestive biscuits, 125g butter at room temperature, 600g soft cheese, 60g caster sugar and 200ml double cream

Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C.
2. Blend the digestive biscuits and the butter in a food processor until the mixture looks like wet sand.
3. Then, press the mixture into the bottom of the tin (20cm) and bake for 10-12 minutes.
4. Cool the base while preparing the filling.
5. Stir in a bowl the soft cheese and the caster sugar. Continue by adding the double cream. Pour the mixture in the tin and smooth with a spoon or a spatula.
6. Leave to set in the fridge for 1 hour or better overnight and serve with strawberries or raspberries.

Healthy Banana Pancakes

All you need is:

1 large banana, 2 medium eggs (beaten), pink of baking powder, splash of vanilla extract and 1 Tsp of oil

Method:

1. In a bowl, mash 1 large banana with a fork until it resembles a thick puree.
2. Stir in 2 beaten eggs a pinch of baking powder and a splash of vanilla extract.
3. Heat a large non-stick frying pan over a medium heat and brush with ½ tsp of oil.
4. Using half the batter, spoon two pancakes into the pan, cook for 1-2 mins on each side, then tip onto a plate. Repeat the process with another ½ tsp of oil and the remaining batter.
5. Top the pancakes with your chosen toppings and serve!

3 ingredient vegan pancakes

All you need is:

1 banana, 375ml of plant milk, 200g of oats and cinnamon (optional)

Method:

1. Put all the ingredients into a blender and blend them until you get a smooth mixture.
2. Ladle the mixture into a frying pan and flip when ready.
3. Enjoy your delicious pancakes with toppings of your choice!
